■ Criteria for Accurate Paraphrasing:

- 1. Vocabulary Change: Replace key words with synonyms or alternative expressions without losing meaning.
- 2. Structural Change: Alter the grammatical structure of the sentence (active/passive, clause reordering, etc.).
- 3. Meaning Preservation: Ensure the paraphrase conveys exactly the same idea as the original sentence.
- 4. Coherence: The paraphrased sentence must fit logically within the paragraph or discourse.
- 5. Academic Style: Use formal and appropriate register when necessary (especially for IELTS and academic writing).

■■ Common Errors to Avoid:

- 1. Word-for-Word Substitution: Merely changing individual words without adjusting the structure.
- 2. Incorrect Synonyms: Using a synonym that alters or distorts the original meaning.
- 3. Grammatical Errors: Producing incorrect sentences after changing the structure.
- 4. Semantic Shift: Changing the original idea or emphasis of the sentence.
- 5. Overcomplication: Making the paraphrased version too complex or unnatural.
