Purpose: To help ESL teachers and learners design and assess effective note-taking tasks in Listening classes.

Level Range: A2 to C1

PART 1 - Sample Note-Taking Pages

Section	Function	Example Notes
Left column - Headings / Main ideas	Topic words, speaker changes, titles	Study habits in college; Shift to online learning; Advantages / Drawbacks
Middle column - Key details / Supporting points	Keywords, numbers, short phrases	time flexibility; self-discipline (low); group projects -> harder
Right margin - Time markers / signals	Approximate timestamps	0:30 Intro; 1:15 Example; 2:10 Result

Tip: Avoid full sentences. Aim for 3-4 keywords per idea.

Classroom task idea: Give students a 2-minute audio. Ask them to use at least five symbols from the list and compare results in pairs.

Organization	Clear layout; columns used effectively	Some structure visible	Notes scattered or messy
Use of Signals & Codes	Consistent, accurate symbols	Some missing or inconsistent	Random, unclear marks
Keyword Focus	Short, meaningful words only	Some full sentences	Too many long phrases
Coverage	Main + key details included	Only main ideas	Incomplete or vague
Readability	Easy to scan and review	Some clutter	Hard to read quickly
